INVASIVE COLONIALISM



Another tactic used by the IDF and Israeli Settlers is to release invasive wild boars onto Palestinian land. The law states killing, harming, or trapping them is illegal. The boars damage crops and property and have even attacked people. (JJP)



Another Israel's colonial tactic is to remove native plants that indigenous Palestinians have a connection to. On occupied stolen land Israelis replace native plants with pine forests. The acidity of the pine trees kills all nearby native plants and the people's connection to it. After 1967 this tactic has been used to seize and divide Palestinian territory within east Jerusalem and the occupied West Bank. (JJP)



Salam Alykom Wa Rahmatullahi Wa Barakatuhu | السلام عليكم ورحمة الله وبركاته

Dear Muslim Brothers and Sisters,

We have a problem. A very big one. One that we cannot simply ignore. One that could be a significant sin on your scales on the day of judgement. What is this problem? We are failing to protect something that was entrusted to us, an amanah. What is that? The Environment, and the Earth we live in.

Here is why I am addressing Muslim brothers and sisters. As I mentioned earlier, this Earth was an amanah entrusted to us, Muslims! I have evidence to support this, but before that, I want to take a moment and share this: According to various scholars, The Qur'an mentions wasteful consumption (Isrāf) as the thirty-second greatest sin (al-islam.org).

Al-Quran Al-Kareem

1 يَا أَيُّهَا آدَمُ كُنْ ذُو زِينَةٍ عِنْدَ كُلِّ مَسْجِدٍ وَكُلُوا وَاشْرَبُوا وَلَا تُسْرِفُوا إِنَّهُ لَا يُحِبُّ
الْمُسْرِفِينَ

Translation: O Children of Adam! Dress properly whenever you are at worship. Eat and drink, but do not waste. Surely He does not like the wasteful. - 7:31

Commentary: So we can see in this ayah, it is definitive and clear cut what is being mentioned. Allah is not saying avoid eating and drinking, he saying do so, but do not be wasteful in doing so. But a lot of us today take the “eat and drink” part, and forget the don’t be wasteful part.

2 إِنَّ الْمُبَذِّرِينَ كَانُوا إِخْوَانَ
الشَّيَاطِينِ “وَكَانَ الشَّيْطَانُ لِرَبِّهِ كَفُورًا

Translation: Surely the wasteful are ‘like’ brothers to the devils. And the Devil is ever ungrateful to his Lord. - 17:27

Commentary: Now this is scary. Allah (SWT) is saying that the people who waste are like brothers to Shaitaan. Now if that is not scary enough, well if we continue, the ayah says, “And the Devil is ever ungrateful to his Lord”. I think it’s fair to say that we don’t want to be from amongst this group.

3 وَهُوَ الَّذِي أَنْشَأَ جَنَّاتٍ مَّعْرُوشَاتٍ وَغَيْرَ مَعْرُوشَاتٍ وَالنَّخْلَ وَالزَّرْعَ مُخْتَلِفًا أَكْلُهُ وَالزَّيْتُونَ وَالرُّمَّانَ مُتَشَابِهًا وَغَيْرَ مُتَشَابِهٍ كُلُوا مِنْ ثَمَرِهِ إِذَا أَثْمَرَ وَءَاتُوا حَقَّهُ يَوْمَ حَصَادِهِ وَلَا تُسْرِفُوا إِنَّهُ لَا يُحِبُّ الْمُسْرِفِينَ

Translation: He is the One Who produces gardens—both cultivated and wild—and palm trees, crops of different flavours, olives, and pomegranates—similar 'in shape', but dissimilar 'in taste'. Eat of the fruit they bear and pay the dues at harvest, but do not waste. Surely He does not like the wasteful. - 6:141

Commentary: This too makes a lot of sense. Allah (SWT) is mentioning all the blessings He has granted us with. He then also **orders** us to not waste, and He mentions His stance on those who waste.

Ahadeeth An-Nabi' Muhammad (ﷺ)

1 عَنْ أَبِي ذَرٍّ، قَالَ قَالَ رَسُولُ اللَّهِ ﷺ " جُعِلَتْ لِي الْأَرْضُ طَهُورًا وَمَسْجِدًا

Translation: The earth has been made for me purified and as a mosque - **Abi Dawood 489**

Commentary

: Look at what we have turned it into. What was once made a purified Earth and a place of worship.

2 عَنْ عَبْدِ اللَّهِ بْنِ حُبَيْشٍ، قَالَ قَالَ رَسُولُ اللَّهِ صَلَّى اللَّهُ عَلَيْهِ وَسَلَّمَ " مَنْ قَطَعَ بَسْدْرَةَ " صَوَّبَ اللَّهُ رَأْسَهُ فِي النَّارِ "

Translation: The Prophet (ﷺ) said: If anyone cuts the lote-tree, Allah brings him headlong into Hell.

Commentary: Now, although this hadith specifically mentions the lote-tree, we can infer that the broader meaning applies to plants at a whole. Now the punishment is describes very clearly for who does such an action.

3 عَنْ عَبْدِ اللَّهِ بْنِ عَمْرٍو، أَنَّ رَسُولَ اللَّهِ ﷺ - مَرَّ بِسَعْدٍ وَهُوَ يَتَوَضَّأُ فَقَالَ " مَا هَذَا الشَّرْفِ " . فَقَالَ أَفِي الْوُضُوءِ إِسْرَافٌ قَالَ " نَعَمْ وَإِنْ كُنْتَ عَلَى نَهْرٍ جَارٍ . "

Translation: The Messenger of Allah passed by Sa'd when he was performing ablution, and he said: 'What is this extravagance?' He said: 'Can there be any extravagance in ablution?' He said: 'Yes, even if you are on the bank of a flowing river.'" - **Ibn Majah 425**

Commentary:

The Prophet Muhammed ﷺ is talking about Wudu/Ablution. Now let me ask a question. How are we supposed to make wudu out of water with najasah (impurities)? Now this is threatning the validation of our wudu, and by further extension, our salah.

We have a duty as Muslims to protect this amaanah.

“According to the Qur’an, preserving the environment is a religious duty in addition to a social obligation (Fard-Kifayah), and is not considered an optional matter.” (mdpi.com)

You may have heard all this *taking-care-of-our-enviroment* talk from a more abstract perspective. Now I just brought it to you into our deen, our way of life.

Hopefully this letter will now change your perspective of how we look at our environment. It is a very serious issue, that unfortunately, is often dismissed in the world of politics.

Ya Allah! Grant our environment purification, nourishment, and prosperity!

Ya Allah! Help change our hearts, and the hearts of those around us, in how we view environmental-care



jewelry and says “I really liked it and I think it will help the people in Palestine.”




After a while even more people started coming. It was like customer after customer. It was cool to

After a long day it was time to pack up. There was a crew that would put the canopy back to its


place. And also others folded chairs and put the table back in its place. We raised \$2,533.10 to give




She turned the car off, then on again, and it worked, so we got back on the freeway. But then,

We walked on, and eventually stopped for lunch. I had brought ramen to make on my stove.


